- ◆ Discussed the 2019/2020 budget and set public hearing date to adopt 2020/2021 budget. The public hearing will be held on Thursday, June 11th beginning at 6 p.m.
- ◆ Held a public hearing and adopted an ordinance increasing the water requirement for annexations (two acre feet per acre annexed).
- ◆ Zach Leavitt, AOG Regional Planner, discussed ideas for updating Annabella's General Plan.
- ◆ Jacob Olsen, Jones & DeMille, reported on the culinary water improvement project.
- ◆ Adopted a resolution governing procedures for electronic meetings.

Meter Readings

The new automatic water meters should be installed to all connections by the end of June. This means that instead of reading culinary waters meters (and billing for overages) every other month, meters will be read monthly. Overages are calculated for any water amount over 10,000 gallons. This water bill includes water use from April and May. The next bill will include water use from June.

Water Conservation tips from

1. Try to add more days between watering. Allowing your lawn to dry out between watering creates deeper roots and allows you to water deeper and less often.
2. Water brown spots in your lawn with a hose (during allowed watering times) instead of increasing the time on your timer.
3. Instead of washing your car in the driveway, park it on the lawn where it won't go to waste.
4. Water your lawn only when it needs it. If you leave footprints on the grass, it is usually time to water.

Remember that not all brown spots in your lawn are caused from lack of water. If you have distinct irregularly shaped brown spots, the symptoms are most severe in late summer, and section of dead turf can be pulled up easily, the problem is probably grubs, a beetle larva. They feed on your turf's root system and kill it. If you question what is causing your turf problem, contact your USU Extension County Office or a local nursery professional.
